Meet the Villagers: Jan Fenty



Jan Fenty brings abundant energy and enthusiasm to her volunteer work for Mount Pleasant Village. She serves on the Diversity Committee and frequently hosts the Mindful Meditation interest group. With Bonnie Cain, she co-founded the "Meet-the-Street" events, where Villagers gather periodically at Mount Pleasant Street restaurants to socialize and sample the diverse cuisines of our neighborhood.

Jan was born and raised in Buffalo, New York, graduating from Buffalo State College with a degree in special education. She is a first-generation Italian immigrant; her father came from a small town near Rome, in the 1920s, when he was only age 16. He settled in Buffalo, where his older brother lived, and later met his wife, also an Italian immigrant. After leaving Italy, Jan's father never saw his parents again. Jan says that her parents valued education and her father worked in construction to put Jan and two siblings through college. During college Jan participated in an exchange program in Italy, where she was able to connect with her Italian cousins, a relationship that continues to this day.

While in college, Jan worked at the local Sears department store, where she met future husband Phil Fenty. Jan said that neither family was initially supportive of their interracial marriage, so, in 1967, she and Phil decided to move to Washington, D.C., and have been here since. The couple quickly fell in love with D.C.'s international flavor and openness. Jan pursued her chosen field of special education and Phil worked at a nearby Sears. As this was the Vietnam war era, they both became involved with the peace movement. And, as anticipated, once they began having children, the families quickly reconciled.

In 1984, Jan and Phil obtained the first Fleet Feet franchise on the east coast and opened their running store in Adams Morgan. It quickly became a mecca for serious runners and made the Fentys known throughout the region. All of their three boys worked in the store as they were growing up. In 2009, Jan and Phil retired and son Shawn took over the thriving business.

The Fenty name is also well-known due to their middle son, Adrian, who served as the District's mayor from 2007 to 2011. Jan said that being the mother of the mayor was an exciting experience.

In retirement, Jan enjoys traveling and the theater. One of her joys is her relationship with ten-year-old granddaughter Aerin. Fortunately for us, Jan is also dedicated to the success of the Village.

Helping Hands Launches New Buddy System to Assist Seniors

If you need assistance from our Village Helping Hands Program that goes beyond a ride to a medical appointment or help with a specific task, consider contacting Helping Hands for a Buddy. Here is how our new Buddy System works: A Village member who wants additional support, such as more social contact, or has other ongoing needs, is paired with a vetted Village volunteer. The volunteers and members decide together the buddy activities will be, such as: a daily check-in call, a weekly walk together, grocery shopping together, or friendly visits. The pair remain buddies for a mutually agreed upon time, as long as both are satisfied with the arrangement.

Know Your Neighbors, Know Your History: Mount Pleasant Lore



More than fifty people attended the Village Diversity Committee's first in a series of *Know Your Neighbors, Know Your History* programs. "Hear Mount Pleasant" was a conversation with some of the leaders involved in the successful effort to bring live music back to Mount Pleasant Street restaurants and who helped begin dismantling the "voluntary agreements" imposed on our neighborhood Latino restaurants.

Village member Rick Reinhard introduced the program and speakers. Villager Olivia Cadaval, former



Smithsonian Folklife curator and former Director of El Centro de Arte, served as program moderator. The conversation was anchored by the leaders of the movement, Village members Claudia Schlosberg and Wayne Kahn, along with Mount Pleasant Street restaurant owner Don Jaime Carrillo, who was committed to bringing live music back to his venue. Also participating were musicians Roger St. John and Eugene Stevanus, both active in the campaign.



Claudia Schlosberg, a leader of "Hear Mount Pleasant," described the actions of the leadership of the



Mount Pleasant Neighborhood Alliance, who from the late 1990s to early 2000s forced "voluntary agreements" on seven Mount Pleasant Street restaurants. While the agreements initially focused on such issues as trash, advertising, happy hours, and alcohol service, they were extended to essentially ban live music, karaoke and dancing in local restaurants, including restaurants that had

provided musical entertainment for several years.

Rather than work with local restaurants to address concerns as they arose, the Alliance Leadership took an adversarial approach, threatening the primarily Latino business owners with loss of their liquor licenses and income if they did not sign the agreements. Claudia, Wayne Kahn, and Don Jaime

Carrillo described the Alliance as a small group of people who imposed their vision for our community without input from the residents, many of whom supported live music. To appreciate the context of how this came about, the Alliance actions took place soon after the Mount Pleasant riots in 1992, and their actions were driven, in part, by a desire to keep Mount



Pleasant from becoming the raucous Adams Morgan. However, many feel they went too far and were too heavy-handed in their approach, particularly against Latino businesses. "Hear Mount Pleasant" galvanized broad community support for live music in our local restaurants and worked with volunteer lawyers to wage legal challenges to the "voluntary agreements" and the Alcoholic Beverage



Control Board's (ABCB) failure to take into account Advisory
Neighborhood Commission (ANC) support for live music. Court
rulings in 2009 and 2011 supported the ANC positions and
overturned the "voluntary agreements," allowing the ABCB to relax
the restrictions. Currently, only Purple Patch is still operating under
the stricture, but has applied to terminate the agreement.

Following the conversation, many participants retired to Haydee's Restaurant to enjoy good food,

friends, and music.

Villagers Tour UDC Green Roof

A group of Villagers recently toured the University of the District of Columbia's green roof, learning



about some innovative practices taking place in our own city. In 2015, the College of Agriculture, Urban Sustainability and Environmental Sciences inaugurated a 20,000 square foot green roof on top of Building 44 on the Van Ness campus. Green roofs promote energy efficiency, help to cool buildings, and reduce storm water runoff. What makes UDC's green roof unique is that it is food-

producing. Also a showcase for green infrastructure, a storm water harvesting system has been installed to collect rainwater in two 500-gallon cisterns. The system is designed to capture water which is then circulated through hoses embedded throughout the rooftop and in the plant boxes and beds. In addition to the outside green space, the roof includes a greenhouse and classroom. An interesting tidbit: UDC is the only exclusively urban land-grant college in the nation.
