A dozen Villagers met recently for breakfast at one of the restaurant pillars of Mt. Pleasant Street, Don Jaime's. In addition to delicious food and a chance to chat with neighbors, we learned how Jaime Carrillo came to establish his restaurant in Mount Pleasant. Born in Bolivia, Mr. Carrillo came to the U.S. as a young man, working in hotels and restaurants in the District. He learned his cooking skills from courses at Carlos Rosario International Public Charter School, the starting place for many young immigrants. He was able to purchase his Mount Pleasant property in 1975, and opened his own restaurant in 1983. Don Jaime's menu is eclectic, reflecting the tastes and flavors of a variety of Latin American countries.

On Saturday, August 18, at 10:00am join the Mount Pleasant Villagers for a visit to Food & Friends.



This Open House Tour will give Village members a chance to learn more about the services Food & Friends provide and the range of individual and group volunteer opportunities available.

Founded in 1988, Food & Friends began in the basement of the Westminster Presbyterian Church with 20 volunteers delivering meals to 60 HIV-positive clients. Since their inception, they have moved from a cramped church basement to their own state-of-the-art kitchen and pantry facility. They have initiated new programs to meet the changing needs of people living with HIV/AIDS, cancer, and other life-challenging illnesses and disabilities in the Washington, DC metropolitan area. Last year, they served close to 3,000 clients per day with a range of serious illnesses, developing special menus, as needed. Volunteers are still at the core of their success.
